NOTES AND EXPLANATIONS

The tables are organized around certain topics and content areas. A short discussion will precede each set of tables. For easy reference, every question within a topic is labeled "Item __" in the discussion. For example, the question "When did you become associated with your group?" within the topic Recruitment is Item 1.

Each group is identified by number only. Old members are indicated by the abbreviation "OM"; new members by "NM".

Much of the discussion of the tables will be based on results for old members only, since numbers for new members are frequently too small for meaningful analysis.

In many cases, results are not available for new members because they were asked fewer questions than old members. When available, new members' responses are included. Keep the small numbers in mind when reading the tables.

A. RECRUITMENT

All groups recruit their members primarily in the first year; Group 2 is more likely to attract people in the later years as well (Item 1). When asked to check various reasons for joining and then to indicate details on some reasons, most group members, except those in Group 2, mention religious beliefs. Group 2 members are more likely to say political, ethical, or intellectual values drew them to the group (if they give values reasons at all, which they tend not to do) (Item 2). When it comes to activities reasons for joining, religious programs predominate less than the religious values. Intellectual-cultural activities (again very strong for Group 2) and social activities are important reasons for joining. Note, however, that a fairly large proportion of all groups did not give activities reasons at all (Item 3). Other possible reasons for joining were: liking people in the group before joining, a frequently checked reason for Groups 2, 3 and 5 (Item 4), and being encouraged by someone back home, which was mentioned by all groups except Group 2 (Item 5).

B. PARTICIPATION

Several measures (Items 1, 2 and 4) show that the <u>over-all</u> amount of time spent by members on the group is highest in Group 1, with Groups 3, 4 and 5 following. Group 2 shows the least amount of over-all time. These differences are reflected in other ways: new members in Groups 3, 4 and 5 anticipate spending more time than those in Group 2 (Item 5). Old members in Group 1 most often say they spend more time currently on the group (Item 6). Aside from amount of time, the groups emphasize — or even specialize — in different <u>kinds</u> of participation. Groups 1 and 4, with 3 and 5 to a lesser degree, have high church attendance (Item 14). Groups 1 and 3 have high participation in study groups (Item 13). Groups 3, 4 and 5 more often emphasize community service projects (Item 12). There is high member participation in public events and social events for all groups (Items 10 and 11). As for participation in meetings, committees, etc (Items 7, 8, 9 and 15), the groups vary on any one particular form. Generally, however, participation in all groups is high — with Group 5 leading in all types of meetings attended.

C. IMPORTANCE OF AND COMMITMENT TO THE GROUPS

Group 1 reappears as the group which has greatest importance for its members, with the others following in the order 3, 4, 5 and 2 (Items 1, 2 and 4). Members of Groups 2, 3, 4 and 5 - asked to recall how they felt when they first joined are less likely to remember the group as being crucially important or very important than do members of Group 1 (Item 3). Another indication of the importance of the group is the extent to which members have talked over personal problems or feel free to do so with people in the group (Items 5-8). Over all the different categories of people, a large proportion of the members feel free to discuss personal problems, particularly with the advisor or with close friends in the group. Members of Groups 2, 4 and 5 feel less comfortable about talking over personal problems with other members who are not close friends or with officers than do members of Groups 1 and 3. Yet, when asked what they would miss most if they had to leave the group (Item 12), members of Group 1 less often check friendships than do other groups. Group 1 members most often say they would miss the ideals and values of the group. All members show high levels of satisfaction and would come to the defense of the group if there were strong opposition to it at the University (Items 9 and 10). Group 1 also comes out strongest, with Group 3 following, in willingness to prevent the dissolution of the group in the face of member disinterest (Item 11).

D. FRIENDSHIPS

These are all friendly groups, but a good number of the members wish they had even more friends in the groups (Items 1 and 2)! Group 1 members' two best friends at the University are most likely to be in the group, Groups 3 and 4 to a lesser extent, while University friends for members of Groups 2 and 5 are found to a larger extent outside the group (Item 3). Of those friends in the group, many were known before joining — with the exception of Group 1. Best friendships for members of Group 1, it appears, are formed as a result of membership in the group (Item 4).

E. GROUP NORMS

From the several questions tapping members' perceptions of the group's concern with involving people in its programs and values, Group 1 comes out strongest, Group 3 next strong, and Groups 4, 5 and 2 follow in approximately that order (Items 1-6). In general, new members of Group 3 perceive greater concern with these issues than do old members. Pressure to share values in Groups 1 and 3 is greater than pressure to participate (compare Item 1 with 3 and Item 2 with 4), while pressure to participate is clearly greater than sharing values in Group 2. None of the groups agree to any great extent that the group changes with new crops of members, although Group 2 members are a little higher than the other groups (Item 7). When asked to judge whether they have changed in various ways as a result of their membership in the group, members vary within each group - from those who say "a great deal" (the minority), to those who say "somewhat, a little" (the majority in all groups except Group 1), to those who say "not at all" (Items 8 and 9). Members of Group 1 are least likely to say they have changed. Of those who say they did change, friends and the advisor are of most significance (except in Group 3, where the advisor is less significant); officers and most respected and admired persons are less significant (Items 10-13).

F. PERCEPTIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY

Using 12 adjective pairs, members rated the extent to which one of each pair applied to the University. For instance, they were asked to apply "politically conservative - politically liberal" to the University, using the following five-point scale:

- 1. "Politically conservative" is very characteristic of the University.
- 2. "Politically conservative" is fairly characteristic of the University.
- 3. Neither adjective is characteristic of the University; mid-point.
- 4. "Politically liberal" is fairly characteristic of the University.
- 5. "Politically liberal" is <u>very</u> characteristic of the University. The results for the five groups are presented in the form of a $\underline{\text{mean}}$ (or average)

rating for each adjective pair.

All groups see the University as on the politically liberal end, Groups 2 and 4 to a lesser degree than the other groups (Item 1). Group 2 sees the University as more conventional than do the other groups; Group 1 sees the University as least conventional (Item 2). The same findings (Items 3, 4, 6, 7, 8 and 9) hold for intellectuality (Group 2 sees least intellectuality, Group 1 most), rejection of traditional religion (Group 2 sees least rejection, Group 1 most), openness (Group 2 sees least, Group 1 most), absorption in social life (Group 2 sees least, Group 1 most), and liberal conceptions of sex standards (Group 2 sees least liberalness, Group 1 most). On the war in Viet Nam (Item 5), Groups 1 and 2 agree that the University is a little supporting, although none of the groups differ greatly on this item. All of the groups see the University as on the cold and tense side, Group 1 to the greatest extent (Items 10 and 12). University attitudes toward fraternities and sororities are seen by all groups as more positive than negative (Item 11).

G. RELATIONS BETWEEN THE GROUP AND OTHER GROUPS

Not many members feel that either the faculty or the general student body are aware of what their groups are doing, although Group 2 members feel somewhat greater awareness of their group on the part of the faculty (Items 1 and 2). Whatever they think is the perception of their group at the University, members of Group 2 say that they are being accurately perceived, while a fairly large proportion of the other groups, particularly Groups 3 and 5, feel they are perceived inaccurately (Item 3). On the question of influence on the group by other groups, none of the groups feel that either the faculty or the general student body have a great deal of influence; Group 1 expresses the least amount of impact from these sources (Items 5 and 6). However, when it comes to influence from the church or congregation, Groups 1 and 4 feel there has been considerable or a great deal of influence (Item 4). Members feel the church should have about the same amount of influence - Group 1 feels it should have a little less - than it actually does have (compare Items 4 and 7). The groups are also generally satisfied that the faculty and student body have about the amount of influence they should have, although some members think faculty and/or students should have more influence; Groups 1 and 3 feel they should have less (compare Item 5 with 8 and Item 6 with 9). Turning these questions around, what influence do the groups see themselves as having? Groups 3, 4 and 5 feel they have influenced other branches of their organization outside the University (Item 10). None of the groups strongly report influence on the faculty (Item 11) or the administration (Item 12), with the possible exception of Group 2. All of the members feel their groups have had more impact on the student body, particularly Group 3 (Item 13). Finally (Item 14), a minority of the members say that there are some aspects of the University which create difficulties for their groups (unfortunately, we do not know what these difficulties are) and that there is some opposition to their group (Item 15). Group 3, particularly, sees opposition and difficulties at the University more

than do the other groups.

H. PERCEPTIONS OF THE GROUP

The 12 adjective pairs used for the University, when applied to the five groups, show sharp differences - among groups and compared to perceptions of the University. In all cases except unconventionality and warmth, Groups 1 and 2 are at opposite poles, as we noted earlier in their perceptions of the University. Going through item by item: Group 2 sees itself as very liberal politically, with Groups 5, 4, 3 and 1 following in that order toward greater conservatism (Item 1). Group 2 sees itself as unconventional, while the other groups are further toward the conventional end (Item 2). All groups describe themselves on the intellectual side, Group 2 to the greatest extent (Item 3). Group 1 sees itself as very accepting of traditional religious beliefs, Groups 3, 4 and 5 to a lesser extent, Group 2 much less (Item 4). Group 2 and, to a lesser degree Group 5, are against the war in Viet Nam; the other groups are closer to the mid-point (Item 5). All groups see themselves as open, warm (with the possible exception of Group 5), and fairly relaxed (Items 6, 10 and All are not terribly absorbed in social life (Item 7) but more absorbed in academics (Item 8). Group 2 members describe their group as having liberal conceptions of sex standards; the other groups are more conservative, particularly Group 1 (Item 9). None of the groups are strongly pro or anti fraternities and sororities; Group 2 is somewhat more negative (Item 11).

The groups show wide divergencies in their responses to a number of hypothetical situations designed to tap the breadth of their interests. For all situations, Group 1 members are least likely to say that the group would consider them appropriate for discussion and/or action, although they are highly likely to consider the items on religion appropriate — along with the other groups (Items 13 and 14). Group 2 sees appropriateness in the APA, honors program, civil rights, Viet Nam and women's hours situations (Items 15, 16, 18, 19 and 21). Group 3 is strong on tutoring and civil rights (Items 17 and 18); Group 4 on APA, tutoring, civil rights and Viet Nam (Items 15, 17, 18 and 19); and Group 5 on APA, civil rights and Viet

Nam (Items 15, 18 and 19). None of the groups indicates varsity sports as highly appropriate, although Group 2 sees this topic as more appropriate than do the other groups (Item 20).

I. INFLUENCE AND EFFECTIVENESS WITHIN THE GROUP

All the groups feel that the president and the officers have much influence in the group, Groups 1 and 2 to a lesser extent than the other groups (Items 1 and 2). On the other hand, they see the membership as having less influence than the officers; still, the majority in Groups 1, 2, 3 and 4 say members have considerable influence (Item 3). The advisor, except in Group 3, is seen as exerting much influence (Item 4). Members of Groups 4 and 5 describe the existence of factions to a greater extent than do the other groups (Item 5). In an "everyone can win" spirit, all the members feel their groups are effective. Group 2 is especially ebullient (Items 6 and 7).

J. INTERESTS AND BELIEFS OF MEMBERS

Members of Groups 1, 3 and 4 say they are in very high or high agreement with the beliefs and values of their groups; a somewhat smaller proportion in Groups 2 and 5 describe high agreement (Item 1). A large number of Group 1 members expect to belong to a similar organization after college; fewer people in the other groups (though a majority in Group 3) say they will (Item 2). All groups show little interest in campus issues, being "cool," or dating (Items 3, 7, 11). Group 2 is low relative to the other groups in academic concerns but high in its concern with the world of ideas (Items 4 and 6). Group 1 members are particularly concerned with studies, as are Groups 3, 4 and 5 to a lesser extent. Group 2 members express interest in international understanding and the contemporary political scene (Items 5 and 10); Group 5 shares to a lesser extent the international concern, while the other groups express less interest. Group 2 shows fairly high interest in the arts relative to the other groups (Item 8) but low interest in religious standards and beliefs (Item 9). Here, as we might expect, Groups 1 and 3 display extensive interest, with Groups 4 and 5 following (Item 9).
